Here are just a few quick facts about what we've done together this year.

OUTREACH

Our Campus Connect project helped us reach out to incoming students from throughout our synod.

- Collected the names of 274 college students from 33 congregations in our synod
- Passed on information about 183 students to 73 other Lutheran Campus Ministry sites across the country
- Reached out to 165 incoming UW-Madison, Edgewood, and Madison College students over the summer and when they arrived on campus this fall
- Provided bike tune-ups at 2 bike clinics to help students get around campus safely

HOSPITALITY

Lutheran Campus Ministry continues to be a "home away from home" for students on campus, creating an affirming community for all students, regardless of religious affiliation.

- Welcomed about 300 individual students each week
- Brewed over 500 pounds of coffee beans (that's over 20,000 cups of coffee!)
- Served about 19,000 lunches to college students (that's about 100 each day during the school year)

WORSHIP

The heart of our mission is centered on students worshipping and growing in faith together.

- Gathered each Sunday night for worship, dinner, and Bible study (57 individuals participated during 2017)
- Organized the first ever state wide LCM Social Justice retreat, which gathered 18 students from 4 campus ministry sites

PROGRAM DEVELOPMENT

After adopting a strategic plan in early 2017, we began developing two new programs.

- Welcomed the Badger Caring Closet, a personal essentials pantry that distributes clothing, household items, school supplies, and toiletries three times each week to students in need
- Began work with Luther Memorial Church to develop "The Keep," a student resource center that will host a food pantry and five student-run projects that care for the basic needs of the campus and community, beginning in early 2018
- Worked with the School of Human Ecology to host Leah Holloway as a ministry intern. Leah served at Lutheran Campus Ministry and at Skaalen Home in Stoughton.
- Developed a program plan and applied for grant funding to gather a cohort of 5 Faith & Vocation Fellows in 2018, each of whom will serve in a church-related ministry site.
